5. How can we determine if our anger is righteous?
6. What are signs that our anger is not righteous?
7. What does unrighteous anger expose in our lives?
8. What does Paul mean when he says, "Don't let the sun go down on your anger?" Why is this wise counsel?
9. How does anger give the devil an opportunity?
10. How does the life of Christ and our life in Christ give us all we need to "be angry and not sin?"
11. What steps do you need to take in examining your anger?
